It is a great pleasure for me to welcome you to the Sport Climbing competition of the Olympic Games Paris 2024. While this is our second Olympic appearance following our debut three years ago at Tokyo 2020, there are still be plenty of firsts in store for us at Le Bourget Climbing Venue this 5-10 August. Most importantly, of course, is the fact that our athletes will be competing in front of a live audience in Paris, something they were unfortunately deprived of in Tokyo due to COVID-19 restrictions.

As you all know, having spectators in attendance significantly enhances the atmosphere of a sporting event, and we expect our athletes to really feed off the energy created here. This in turn should translate into unforgettable performances on the wall.

Paris 2024 will also be the first time our Boulder & Lead format features alongside Speed at an Olympic Games (in Tokyo all three disciplines were combined). As a result, the total number of medal events for Sport Climbing has doubled from two to four, while the number of climbers has grown from 40 to 68.

When it comes to storylines, therefore, you should definitely be spoiled for choice. Our athletes are our greatest ambassadors, and to help you get to know them better, we have included short bios on each in this Media Guide. But don't stop there.

I encourage all of you to make the effort to speak with the athletes in the mixed zone and in one-on-one interviews to help you to learn more about their exceptional histories, personalities, accomplishments and – why not – their families and their entourage, who are often obscured but are fundamental in creating the conditions of their performances on the field of play.

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WHAT IS THE IFSC?

The International Federation of Sport Climbing (IFSC) was created on 27 January 2007 as a continuation of the International Council for Competition Climbing, which was created in 1997. An international non-governmental and non-profit organisation, the IFSC's main objectives are the direction, regulation, promotion, development, and furtherance of climbing competitions around the world. The IFSC is a member of GAISF, IWGA, ARISF, and ASOIF, and has its sport in the Olympic programme. It is also recognised by the International Paralympic Committee. The last two decades have been a period of spectacular growth for both Sport Climbing and the organisation. Sport Climbing has gained credibility not only as competitive sport, but also for its social values. The IFSC is a young and healthy federation founded on modern sporting principles and values, cultivating them along with sport growth and development. Sport Climbing was officially confirmed as an additional sport in the programme of the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020 during the International Olympic Committee (IOC) Session in Rio de Janeiro, August 2016, and was included as a medal sport in the Youth Olympic Games Buenos Aires 2018. A proposal to include surfing, skateboarding, breaking, and Sport Climbing at the Olympic Games Paris 2024 was unanimously approved at the 134th IOC Session on 25 June 2019. The IOC Executive Board officially confirmed Sport Climbing's inclusion in the programme of the 2024 Olympic Games on 7 December 2020. At the 139th Session of the IOC in Beijing in February 2022, Sport Climbing was confirmed on the Initial Sports Programme of the Olympic Games Los Angeles 2028 as part of a strong focus on youth.

Climbing's debut at Tokyo 2020



During the 129th IOC Session in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in 2016, the International Olympic Committee added Climbing to the programme of the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020.

From 3 to 6 August 2021, a total of 40 Sport Climbing athletes - 20 men and 20 women - competed in a Combined event at Tokyo's Aomi Urban Sports Park, featuring all three disciplines of the sport: Boulder, Lead, and Speed, in one event.

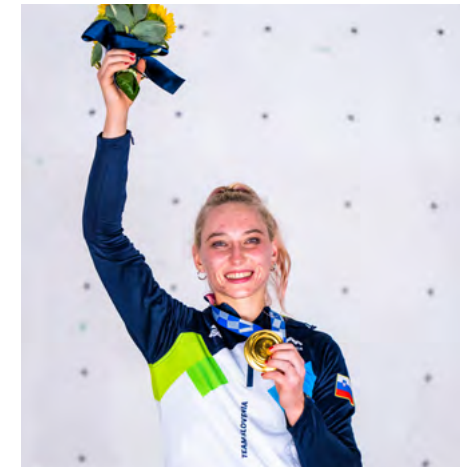
On the 5 August 2021 Sport Climbing's first Olympic champion in history was crowned, where following the men's Combined final, 18-year-old Alberto Ginés López of Spain claimed the Olympic gold medal. In doing so, Ginés López became the youngest Spanish Olympic gold medallist to date.

Slovenia's Garnbret won the women's Combined Olympic gold medal on 6 August, becoming the first female Olympic Champion in the history of Sport Climbing and made more history by carrying the Slovenian flag in the Closing Ceremony, becoming the first flag bearer representing Sport Climbing at an Olympic Ceremony.

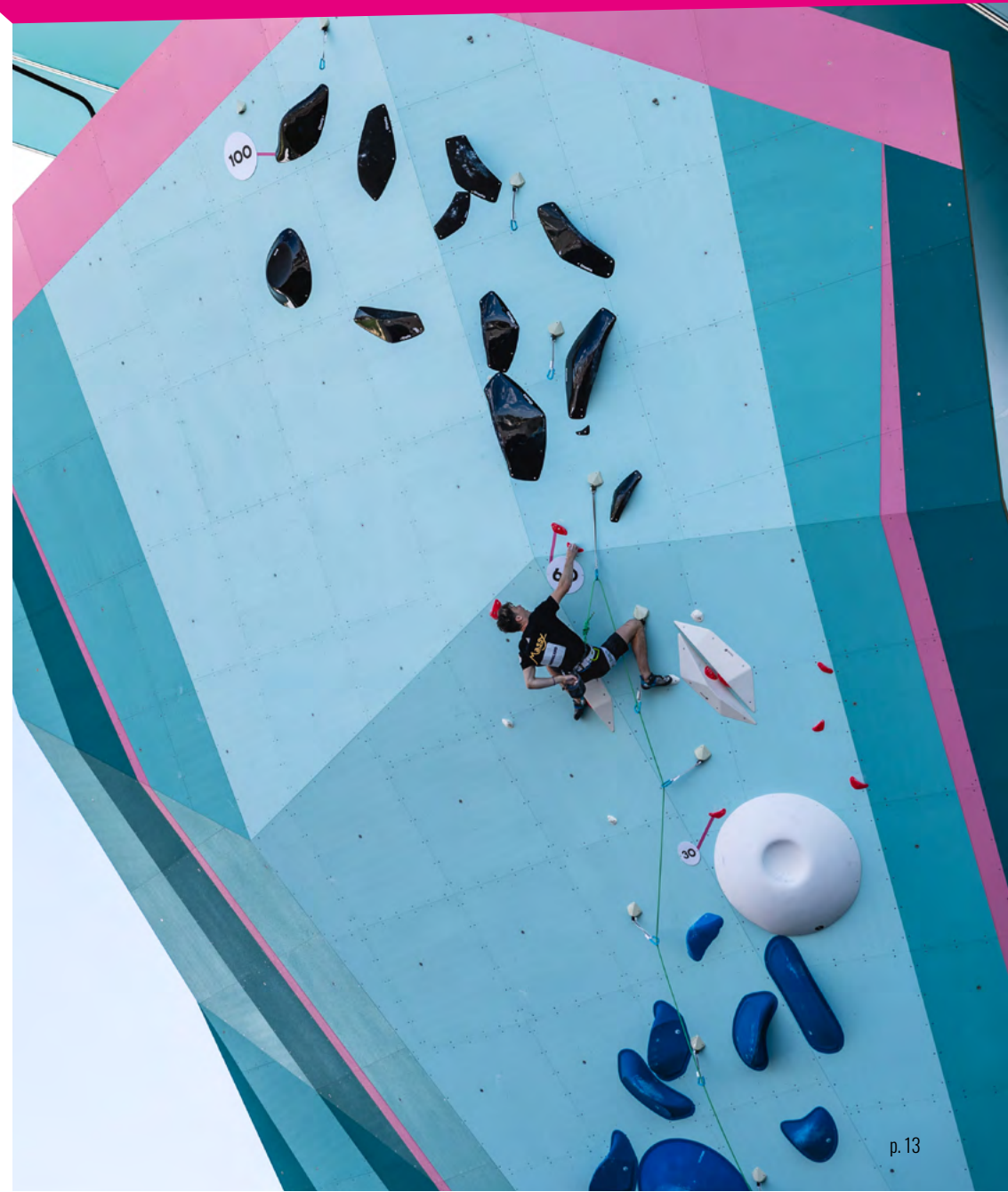

Discipline Explainer

SPEED

Speed

- Raced on a 15m wall
- Two phases to a competition – qualification and final
- Qualification Seeding Heats – the point is to get to the top the quickest
- Qualification Elimination Heats – beat your opponent, but also time is important with one ‘fastest loser’ through to finals
- Finals – beat your opponent

Qualification

Qualification at Paris 2024 is a little different to the regular IFSC World Cup format as entry numbers are restricted to 14.

For this event there is two phases to qualification.

The first you race for the best time to set up the pairings for the second phase. So as normal, the first phase is based purely on time.

The second phase is then elimination racing (similar to finals), but with the added incentive to race for time as one ‘fastest loser’ goes through to finals

Finals

Knock out race format

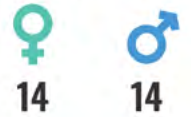
Time and finishing position from qualification gives you your opponent (1 v 8, 2 v 7, 3 v 6 etc)

Although time is important here, it’s all about beating your opponent and progressing to the next round

With eight athletes in finals there will be a quarter-finals, semi-finals and then ‘small final’ for bronze medal and ‘big final’ for gold and silver

**Because qualification is time based and finals opponent based, world records are generally seen in qualification – times have dropped dramatically for men and women since Tokyo 2020 so expect a lot of Olympic records*

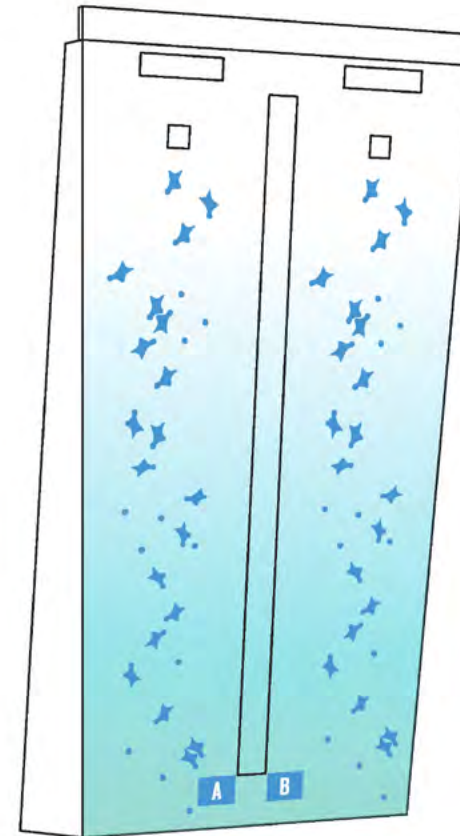

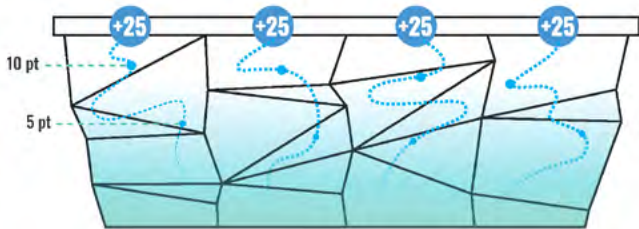

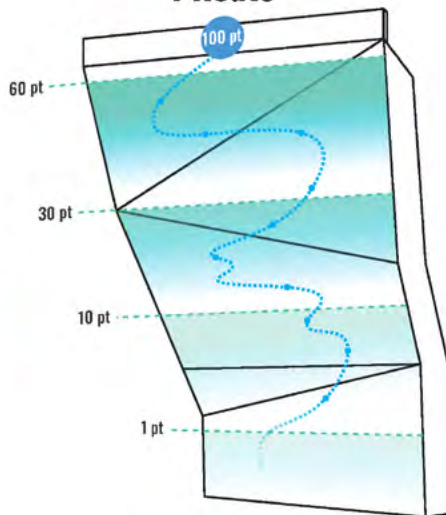

Boulder & Lead

Usually two separate disciplines, they are together for Paris 2024 (and the qualification events for the Games)

First is Boulder – which is problem solving.

There is qualification, semi-final and final. Problems (Boulders) are different for men and women and reset after each round.

You try to complete the problems in qualification and semi-finals without seeing them beforehand (isolation). For the final, each competitor gets two minutes to look at each of the four problems – so a total of eight minutes.

Each competitor will try and solve four problems on a 4m wall in the least number of attempts. They have five minutes to attempt each Boulder for qualification and semi-finals and four minutes for each in the final

Unlike the regular Boulder format, this round has two scoring points on the wall before reaching the top. Scored out of a possible 100 points (4 Boulders x 25 points each).

Reaching the First Point on the wall is 5 points, reaching the Second Point on the wall is 10 points and making the Top is 25 points.

0.1 is deducted from your score every time you make an attempt eg. make top in first attempt is 25 points, make top in second attempt is 24.9 points

This score is taken through to the Lead round.

The aim is to go as high as possible in one attempt within six minutes on a 15m (overhanging) wall The competitors can look at each route for six minutes – six for qualification round, six for semi-final round and six for final round.

There are four scoring sections on the wall, and the higher they climb the more points they are awarded. Scores are assigned to each hold in descending order, starting from the top: the 10 highest holds, including the top, are worth four points each, followed by 10 holds that are worth three points each, 10 that are worth two points each, and 10 that are worth one point each. Any remaining hold before the start of the route has no point value. There will be signage on the wall to tell you the sections. An additional 0.1 points is awarded for using, but not controlling a hold.

Once you have a Boulder and a Lead score they will be added together to give a total of 200 points. Whomever has the highest total wins.

Part of a strong Indonesian Speed team, Desak Dewi qualified for Paris at the first attempt by winning the IFSC Climbing World Championships Bern 2023. Her World Championships win was the first gold medal of her senior career. Desak started climbing at the age of eight after seeing people climbing in her city that piqued her interest. She started competing at the age of 12 before joining the world circuit in 2020 and becoming part of the Indonesian squad. Despite being fully focussed on climbing, Desak describes herself as “a fun person, but embarrassed to start a conversation.” So be sure to approach her and say hello should you see her in Paris!

Emma Hunt is one of the only USA climbers not to live and train in Salt Lake City, Utah. Growing up and still living in the state of Georgia, Emma began climbing at the age of five when her father tried a portable wall in a shopping mall. Starting off competing in Boulder at eight, then Lead at 10, it wasn't until she was 13 that she began concentrating on Speed. It wasn't long before she moved up the rankings in the international competition circuit, winning the 2019 IFSC Youth World Championships, a senior gold at the 2022 World Games and a first IFSC World Cup in 2024 in Salt Lake City. Emma secured her place at Paris 2024 by keeping her nerve and taking advantage of a slip from world record holder Aleksandra Mirosław at the semi-final stage of the 2023 IFSC Climbing World Championships in Bern. That win put her into the final, guaranteeing her one of the two Olympic spots from the event (she ended up finishing second overall). Away from climbing, Emma is a big fan of baking, which she finds relaxing.

The women's Speed world record holder has been the one to beat for some time. A multiple World Cup winner, Miroslaw has lowered her own world record on numerous occasions – however, missing out on Olympic qualification at the IFSC Climbing World Championships took its toll mentally on the Polish climber. Confessing that she went away and evaluated her mental approach to climbing after missing out really helped Miroslaw as she came back to qualify for her second Olympic appearance (she finished fourth at Tokyo 2020 and is the Olympic Speed record holder) by claiming yet another world record at the IFSC European Qualifier Rome 2023. Miroslaw began climbing in 2007 after being inspired by her sister Gosia and wanting to make her proud. She began competing on the international circuit in 2009, winning the first of her 11 World Cup golds in 2012 before going on to win two World Championships titles, in 2018 and 2019. Miroslaw is also a graduate of the Warsaw University of Physical Education (2023) and University of Technology in Lublin (2017).

American Piper Kelly lists her greatest achievement so far as becoming the PanAm Games champion in 2023, and it just so happens that that was the event and title that secured her spot at Paris 2024. Piper is and always has been a sport lover. She played volleyball and football, swam, and did cross country as a child, as well as the sport that has taken her to the Olympic Games. Her climbing journey began in 2006 with her father and sister as a way to spend time together as a family, and that progressed into national competitions in 2011, Youth Worlds in 2016 and a first World Cup in 2018. Despite a major shoulder injury in 2019 that resulted in surgery in 2020 and a year-and-a-half rehabilitation, Piper still tests the boundaries with climbing and powerlifting. With no fewer than eight IFSC World Cup podium finishes (five gold, three bronze) to her name since July 2022, People Republic of China's Deng Lijuan is definitely one to keep an eye out for at Paris 2024. A former Asian Youth and Chinese National champion, Lijuan qualified for the Games by winning the IFSC Asian Qualifier Jakarta 2023 in a time of 6.98. Deng says the athlete she admires most is 110m hurdler Liu Xiang, and she hopes to catch some of the athletics competition as well as swimming and table tennis during her off days at Paris 2024. Although she describes her self as quite 'lively' Lijuan also says she is quite an 'indoorsy' person. Away from climbing, Lijuan's hobbies include baking and photography.

Wanting to try a sport more "fun and positive" after seven years of gymnastics, New Zealander Sarah Tetzlaff has her brother to thank for getting into climbing. It was younger sibling Will whose energy and enthusiasm for the sport attracted Sarah to try, and she hasn't looked back since. She started in 2012, took part in her first nationals in 2016, first continentals in 2017 and first worlds in 2018. And it was the continental route that would prove to be her path to Paris 2024 when she won the Oceania qualifier in Melbourne, Australia courtesy of a "massive personal best" in the final race against home favourite Grace Crowley. Looking back at her journey, Sarah remembers some rather large obstacles that had to be overcome, including the fact that there wasn't even a Speed wall in her country as late as 2018 and COVID-19 putting a stop to her international competition with travel being restricted in New Zealand. A turning point came in 2021 when her coach created a Speed climbing programme with the aim of getting climbers to the LA 2028 Olympics. Sarah and teammate Julian David are graduates of said programme, reaching the goal four years earlier than expected.

Jenya says she will arrive in Paris with a fresh and open mind and no expectations – aside from hoping to catch the Opening and Closing Ceremonies. A music school graduate in piano, Jenya is currently studying psychology with an eye to one day becoming a sports psychologist/therapist.

A two-time Olympian, Mia Krampfl arrives in Paris aiming to improve on her 18th-place finish at Tokyo 2020. She has a number of recent Top 10 finishes to help her case, although her last podium finish at an IFSC event was a bronze in Lead at the 2022 World Cup in Jakarta. A month earlier she claimed silver in Boulder & Lead at the IFSC Europe Continental Championships in Munich, so Mia clearly has what it takes to finish high up the leaderboard at Le Bourget Climbing Venue if she brings her A game to Paris. Mia began climbing in apple trees in her grandparents' garden before graduating to a small warm-up wall used by her older brother. The rest is history. Her first youth national competition came in 2008 when she was eight years old, followed by her first international youth competition seven years later. Mia qualified for Paris 2024 thanks to an eighth-place finish at the Olympic Qualifier Series (seventh in Budapest and 12th in Shanghai). Describing her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020 as a dream come true, she also admits that it was "way more stressful" than she expected. "COVID made the whole experience a bit unique, but we could still experience some of the Olympic spirit, Olympic Village and the greatness of Olympic Games." This time around, Mia says she will "compete, fight, try to show my best and show how much I trained for this!" Should she have any free time, you will find Mia cheering on her Slovenian teammates, regardless of the sport.

Italy's Laura Rogora booked her spot at Paris 2024 with a 12th-place finish at the Olympic Qualifier Series. When she takes to the field of play in Paris, she will become one of only 17 climbers in the world to appear at two Olympic Games – quite the feat in and of itself. She claims the pressure of representing her country got the better of her at Tokyo 2020, where she placed 15th. Laura will therefore be out for redemption in Paris, although this time she will be battling the lingering mental aftereffects of a broken wrist and inflamed tendon suffered last year, her first major injury in the sport she's been perfecting since the age of five. Laura has all the credentials to suggest a deep run is not out of the question at Paris 2024. A competitive climber from the age of seven, she first made headlines outdoors, when at age 14 she became the second youngest climber in history to scale an elite 9a route. Four years ago, she became the second woman to climb an even more difficult 9b route. More recently, she won bronze in the Boulder & Lead competition at the IFSC European Qualifier Laval 2023. As a student and self-professed fan of mathematics, Laura will be aware that she is not the odds-on favourite to be crowned Olympic champion in Paris. But with 18 years of experience, a world-class skillset and the desire to improve upon her performance at Tokyo 2020, could it all add up to a podium finish for Laura this summer? Don't bet against it.

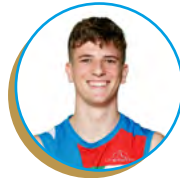

Bassa Mawem set the Olympic Speed record of 5.45 seconds at Tokyo 2020 but had to bow out of the combined Speed, Lead and Boulder competition early due to injury (a total rupture of his lower biceps tendon), thereby depriving the seven-time French national champion of a chance to reach the podium. He will therefore be eager to make amends at Paris 2024, and with Speed now separated from Boulder & Lead, he will definitely fancy his chances. At 39, Bassa is the oldest climber in the competition, but that also means he is the most experienced, having first started climbing a full 24 years ago, longer than many of his competitors have been alive. While recovery from the injury he suffered at Tokyo 2020 was long and arduous, Bassa nevertheless claimed his sixth national title in 2022 in his first competition back, and won his seventh crown in 2023, the same year he qualified for Paris by winning the IFSC European Qualifier in Rome. His sibling Mickael remains Bassa's biggest inspiration, although unlike at Tokyo 2020, his younger brother did not qualify for Paris and will not be competing alongside him here. Bassa works 60 hours a week in climbing development, training both his students and himself, so look for the Speed climbing legend to be in peak physical condition in Paris for what he has indicated will be his competitive swan song.

Fresh off back-to-back IFSC World Cup victories and a new Speed world record set earlier this year, Samuel Watson has rocketed into the gold-medal conversation for Paris 2024. In the last major test ahead of the Games, the 18-year-old posted three times under five seconds (4.83, 4.84, 4.88) en route to victory at the World Cup in Chamonix, France on 13 July. In April, Samuel entered the record books by posting a time of 4.79 seconds during the World Cup in Wujiang, China. The teenager is no stranger to making headlines: in 2022, he became the youngest climber ever to win an IFSC World Cup, doing so at the age of 16 in Edinburgh, Scotland. A year later he qualified for the Olympic Games by winning the Speed event at the 2023 Pan American Games in Santiago with a time of 5.38. Watson has been climbing since the age of five and says he has always loved the Olympics, so competing at Paris 2024 will be the fulfilment of a life-long dream. A massive basketball fan who cites Argentina's Manu Ginóbili and France's Victor Wembanyama as his favourite players, Samuel is likely to be found at the Olympic basketball tournament during any off time he may have in Paris.

Veddriq Leonardo is solidly in the conversation for the title of “world’s fastest climber.” While the current world record (4.79) is held by USA’s Samuel Watson, Veddriq has set the pace three times himself since 2021, including the time Watson had to beat to take the crown. Leonardo first topped the world’s fastest list in May 2021 with a 5.21. He shaved that down to 4.98 in July 2022, before one-upping himself again at the IFSC World Cup in Seoul in April 2023 with a 4.90. That mark stood for a year before Watson’s history-making climb in April 2024, and it’s safe to say that Veddriq will be looking to regain the title at Paris 2024. One thing is certain: The Olympic record of 5.45 (set by Bassa Mawem of France at Tokyo 2020) is definitely within striking distance of the 27-year-old Indonesian, who began climbing in high school after trying it out as part of extracurricular activities. He’s been on the rise ever since, going on to become World Champion in 2022 and a three-time World Cup Season winner from 2021-2023. He qualified for Paris by finishing second in the Olympic Qualifier Series with a win in Shanghai and a third-place finish in Budapest. Asked what he is most looking forward to at his first Olympic Games, Veddriq says patriotically: “The Indonesian national anthem played in Paris.”

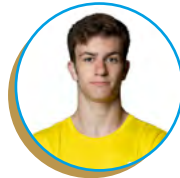

Fast forward ten years and he is heading to Paris for his second Olympic appearance and will take part in the Boulder & Lead event hoping to improve on his 14th-place finish at Tokyo 2020. Looking back at Tokyo, he recalls an intense and challenging experience due to the COVID-19 pandemic, affecting both the event and the preparation period. Looking ahead to Paris 2024, he is most excited about his performance and hopes to be able to watch some basketball games. Before he became a professional athlete, Yufei was active in various Olympic sports, including basketball, handball, swimming, taekwondo, and track and field.
